S6 TOEIC Exam

All F.6 students took the TOEIC Exam on 31st October, 2018. 25 students obtained 700 points or above. 6A Cheng Tsz Lung got the best result of 960 out of 990. All F.6 students took the pre-test last year. 83.9% of students have shown an increase in their overall TOEIC scores this year compared to that of last year. This result shows that their effort in learning English pays off. Smart Education, the sole agent to provide TOEIC Exam in Hong Kong, held a meeting with our F. 6 teachers on the result analysis on 21st December, 2018. Compared to other secondary schools with similar intake of students, LKCSS students have achieved promising results. Constructive advice has been given to our school to boost our students' English proficiency. We hope that LKCSS students can be more confident in learning English so as to achieve higher!

S5 TOEIC Exam

The TOEIC, which is an international examination to measure workplace English skills, was conducted by Smart Education to our S5 students.

119 S5 students took the TOEIC Listening and Reading Exam on 17th April, 2019. All participating students received a reply slip and a certificate to evaluate their performance and recognize their English proficiency in June. As an assessment for learning measure, the TOEIC exam not only offers our S5 students a chance to experience the authentic public exam setting, but also provides meaningful feedback about the students' strengths and weaknesses at various levels. This will help students make the most of the remaining time to prepare for HKDSE English language exam.
